

# 3. Profile the College

# **3.a. Introduction**

Established on July 1, 1964, Morigon College affiliated to Gauhati University is a co-educational institute offering 04 UG pogrammes in Arts, Science and Commerce and BCA, 02 PG programmes in Geography and Zoology, Vocational courses on Food processing, Mass communication and Journalism and 01 PGDC programme on Disaster management. The laboratory of Department of Chemistry is recognized by Gauhati University as capable of facilitating advanced research works.

Morigaon College is affiliated to Gauhati University and recognized under Section 2 (F) and 12 (B) of UGC. It was accredited by NAAC in the year 2005 , 2010,2018 and awarded B grade in all the assessments.

The college is situated on the eastern side of Morigaon town and is 70 kms away from Dispur, the capital of Assam. It has a total campus area of 9.91acre and build up area of 10,607.43 sq.meters. It has boys hostel,girls hostels, principal quarter, indoor stadium, auditorium and play ground.

The college has various committees and cells such as Anti ragging committee, Grievance and redressal cell, sexual harassment cell and unit of NCC and NSS for both boys and girls students, for students support and smooth conduct of other activities. Morgaon college library has enriched with text book, reference books above 40,000, along with e-journal and e-books.

## 3.b. Present status

The college has now prepared for the 4<sup>th</sup> cycle of NAAC accreditation through preparing perspective plane on the basis of seven criterion of NAAC format.

The IQAC is reconstructed after the third cycle of NAAC visit. The IQAC is preparing mechanism and SOP for each cells and committees for developing the overall system college. The IQAC has also reconstructed, re-evaluated and statistical analysis of students, teacher's, alumni, parent's and administrates feedback system.

The IQAC has ready to introducing few value added course under supervision of few departments. The college has also ready for introducing PG programmes on English, Assamese, Political Science, and Mathematics.

The college has also taken place renovation of class rooms with wellequipped ICT facilities. The college campus has fully wi-fi facilities for faculty and administrative branch. The college has MOU with different institution for students training and internship.

## 4. Methodology of the Audit:

A questionnaire in tune with current NAAC assessment accreditation framework has been prepared as shown in the Annexure-1. The metrics are considered where academic department need to be involved. Weights for each metrics are fixed as per their importance for enhancing the quality of the College. A score in the scale of 0-4 is provided based on validation by the audit committee members on the claim made by the departments of the College. CGPA for every department has been evaluated using the following formula.

## 5. Observations:

#### a. Curricular Aspects

Morigaon College is affiliated to Gauhati University. The College follows the curriculum developed by Gauhati University. For effective delivery of curriculum most of the departments are maintaining lesson plan and course diary. However, the detail lesson plan with course progress record needs to be institutionalise. Departments follow academic calendar of Gauhati University. For effective planning of activities academic department can prepare an academic calendar specific to the department following the affiliating University's calendar. Add on/ Certificate programmes are conducted by several departments.

b. Teaching Learning Aspects

Assessment of learning levels after admission to identify slow and advanced learners should be more robust. Though the College follows students centric learning method for effective curriculum delivery however, a detail unit wise plan for experiential and participative learning needs to be maintained for enhancing the learning experiences of the students. The College maintains mentoring system. But documentation of the mentoring system is not adequate. All the departments conduct internal examination as per requirement of the affiliating University. The College may incorporate more different modes for continuous internal evaluation. Program Outcome, Program Specific Outcomes and Course Outcomes are described in the syllabus. Evaluation the attainment of the learning outcomes to be evaluated properly.

c. Research, Innovation and Extension

The overall research culture in the College needs to be strengthened. Several departments are conducting very effective extension activities. Involvement of the students in those activities should be encouraged. Squeezy.in is an exemplary innovation. Such efforts should be encouraged.

## d. Infrastructure

The College has adequate infrastructure facilities for all academic activities. The infrastructure is well maintained. The library and IT facilities are also adequate.

e. Students support and Progression

Several Departments conducting capacity building and skill enhancement activities for the students. Placement of the students and progression to higher education are encouraging. Students need more encouragement for participation in extracurricular activities.

f. Professional development activities

Several teachers are participating in FDP. The rest of the teachers should also regularly participate in FDPs.

(vi) Institute can take imitative for the students interested in sports, extra- curricular and cultural activities for choosing their profession.

(vii) It has also the opportunities for extra rural funding research and infrastructural developmental schemes.

# Challenges:

(i) Resource Mobilization for augmentation of physical and learning infrastructure for development.

(ii) The college is located in an economically backward district & the students have poor socio-economic background.

(iii) Absence of industries in the area for collaboration.

(iv) Encouraging the faculty members to take up research and publications.

(v) Due to locational disadvantage and poverty, the parents are reluctant to send their children for higher education.

(vi) The students, in general, prefer to study in vernacular language.

(vii) Encouraging students for competitive examinations and higher education.

(viii) Girl students with varied socio-economic background.

## 7. Recommendations

Based on the finding the members of the audit committee recommends the following for enhancing the quality of the College:

- i. College needs to establish a language lab
- ii. Research culture needs improvement
- iii. Proper documentation is required for all activities
- iv. Laboratory bearer to be engaged in the laboratories
- v. Best practices of individual department for various aspects need to be institutionalise.
- vi. For effective delivery of curriculum course file to be maintained for every course
- vii. Academic calendar to be prepared at department level following the affiliating University's calendar
- viii. Students should be involved in the extension activities
- ix. More collaborations need to be established for faculty exchange, students exchange, internship etc.
- x. Teachers should participate in FDP programmes to enhance teaching quality.
